of working age veterans are employed. And are as likely to be employed as non-veterans.

of veterans own a house or have a mortgage – as likely as non-veterans.



75%

of veterans aged 16–64 years reported they were in "good" or "very good" health – the same as non-veterans. However, veterans aged 35– 49 years old are significantly more likely to report problems than non-veterans, including; back or neck, leg or feet, and arm or hand related conditions.
